

San Antonio River Improvements Project

Project Partners:

- San Antonio River Authority

- U.S. Army Corps of Engineers







81.3% of the funding is from local public dollars

- City: \$76.7 million property taxes
- County: \$229.4 million flood taxes and hotel sales tax
- Utility: \$6.3 million rate payers

15.8% of the funding is from federal appropriations

• \$60.5 million – income taxes

2.9% of the funding is from private contributions

 \$11.2 million – donations to the San Antonio River Foundation

Total: \$384.1 million





San Pedro Creek Project

Public Costs

- City: \$19.8 million
- County: \$236.1 million
- River Authority: \$1 million
- Utility: \$14.9 million

• Total: \$271.8 million

Return in Private Investment

- \$1.5 billion economic impact expected; projects already done or in development include:
 - Frost Tower built for \$142 million
 - UTSA campus expansion
 - Renovated Hotel
 - New residential building
 - New federal courthouse

Lessons Learned

- Need an ambitious and aspirational vision
- Need public support for and involvement in development of vision
- Explore all government funding options
- Private funding commitments follows government funding and is driven by economic conditions
- This will take years to accomplish! A longterm, sustained commitment from the public, key stakeholders, and government is critical for success
